

Board Adopts Approved Budget

The Sacramento County Board of Supervisors on Sept. 28 formally adopted the Approved Budget for the 2021-22 fiscal year

The Approved Budget in June totaled \$6.5 billion. With the completion of the County's FY 2021-22 year-end financial closing activities and updated information, an increase of \$400 million was proposed, bringing the Budget Recommended for Adoption to \$6.9 billion in appropriations. The increase includes a \$210.7 million increase in General Fund appropriations, and a \$189.6 million increase in appropriations in other funds.



- » \$200,000 to support County Property and Business Improvement Districts (PBIDs)
- » \$75,000 to Effie Yeaw/Soil Born Farms/Camp Pollock park education programs
- » \$65,000 to Sacramento Splash environmental education program

The Approved Budget does not include funding from the County's approximately \$300 million State and Local Fiscal Recovery Fund Allocation under the American Rescue Plan Act. A comprehensive spending plan for these funds is being developed based on priorities identified by the Board.

The Board of Supervisors approved the following additional costs, totaling \$6,758,000 to be paid out of the County's General Fund:

- » \$5M contingency for Afghan Refugee costs
- \$500,000 to augment encampment debris removal
- » \$498,000 to the Regional Parks Park Maintenance Team for four positions, two vehicles and supplies
- \$400,000 for five additional housing navigator positions for the American River Parkway

\$20,000 Hood Franklin Road pedestrian access

Supervisors Appoint County Executive

The Sacramento County Board of Supervisors unanimously agreed to appoint Interim County Executive Ann Edwards as County Executive.

The appointment took effect Sep. 14, 2021. Edwards is the first woman appointed to the County Executive position.

Edwards' accomplishments in her seven month tenure as Acting/ Interim County Executive include increasing transparency in the budget process, organizing a process for a spending plan to provide assistance to both the County and the community with the American Rescue Plan Act funds and increasing engagement with local government and community-based organizations.

"I appreciate and thank the Board for the trust and support they have shown me," said Edwards. "I commit to looking at the County organization in new ways, to pursue a commitment to diversity, equity and inclusion, increase public transparency and engagement and enrich the County's organizational culture." Edwards' current and upcoming initiatives include the formation of a Public Safety and Justice Agency, increased public engagement in and a new budget process for FY 2022-23 and implementing implicit bias training countywide.

About Ann Edwards:

Edwards has served as Acting County Executive since December 2020 and Interim County Executive since February 2021. Before that, she worked as Sacramento County's Director of Human Assistance since 2014 and worked as the Director for Social Services for Solano County. Prior to Solano County, she worked for Sacramento County between 1998 and 2013, serving as Chief Deputy County Executive for Countywide Services, Director of Health and Human Services, Director of Mental Health Services, Division Manager for Adult Mental Health and Program Manager for Child and Family Mental Health.

Edwards holds a Master's degree in Counselor Education and a bachelor's degree in Social Work from California State University, Sacramento.







Do You Recycle Right? We Can Help You Sort Smart!

Recycling is part of our everyday lives, and we know it's important that we don't throw away items that end up in the landfill if they can be reused or recycled. Are you doing everything you can to recycle right? If you need help, it's time to Reboot your Recycling. We are here with Robbie Recycle to help you to sort smart!

WHAT TO KEEP OUT OF YOUR **RECYCLING CART:**

"Tanglers," Food Waste, Liquids, and Household Hazardous Waste

Tanglers, Including:

- 1. Bagged Items All bagged items placed in your Recycling Cart go directly to the landfill, which means what could have been recycled gets buried. Instead, put your empty and dry recyclables loose into your Recycling Cart.
- 2. Plastic Wrap, Bags, Bubble Wrap and Other Flimsy Plastics - These items get stuck in the recycling equipment, and staff must climb into dangerous



equipment to remove them. Flimsy plastics belong in the Garbage Cart or taken to an approved film plastics recycler: PlasticFilmRecycling.org.

- 3. Clothes, Shoes, Blankets/Bedding - Donate clothing/bedding that's gently used, and what's not, put in the Garbage Cart.
- 4. Hangers, Cords, Hoses, Packaging **Straps** – Repurpose/reuse or place in the Garbage Cart.

Food Waste, Liquids, Food-Soiled Items

Recyclables need to be empty and dry. Please make sure your recyclables are free of food waste and liquids before

putting them loose in the Recycling Cart. When a greasy pizza box or quarter jug of spoiled milk are put in the Recycling Cart, the grease and liquid can contaminate not only your cart, but also the entire truckload of recyclables. If this happens, these recyclables end up going to the landfill.

Household Hazardous Waste (HHW):

Items like household batteries, cleaners, pesticides, fluorescent light tubes/bulbs and paint never belong in any of your curbside carts (Garbage, Recycling or Green Waste)! Drop these off for free at any local HHW drop-off site in Sacramento County - learn more at SacGreenTeam.com.

Healthy Teeth for Kids | Healthy teeth not only help children eat, speak and sleep better, they also help them to perform better in school.



With the school year in full swing, the Sacramento County Oral Health Program encourages parents and caregivers to make getting a dental check-up for their children a priority. That's especially true for children entering kindergarten. California requires

that all children have a comprehensive oral check-up by the time they are ready to enter public school. The "Kindergarten Oral Health Assessment" helps schools identify children suffering from untreated dental disease.

Cavities, which are largely preventable, remain the most common chronic childhood disease. In the Sacramento region, more than 46 percent of students have experienced tooth decay by third grade. To help address the issue, the Sacramento County Oral Health Program is partnering with Smile, California, the Medi-Cal Dental Program's campaign to help Medi-Cal members make use of their dental benefit, and the California Department of Public Health's Office of Oral Health, in a statewide Back-Tooth-School effort to raise awareness about the importance of children's dental health.

Medi-Cal Members Can Get Help with Internet Costs

Registration is now open for an emergency broadband program that will help Medi-Cal members and other lowincome residents receive up to \$50 a month to cover their internet costs. All Medi-Cal members qualify, and it will



not affect their health coverage. Funds are limited, so act quickly. To see if you qualify, visit **www.getemergencybroadband.org**.

The Emergency Broadband Benefit Program is a Federal Communications Commission (FCC) program that provides a temporary discount on monthly broadband bills during the COVID-19 pandemic for qualifying low-income households. For more details about the FCC program, visit www.fcc.gov/broadbandbenefit.

To qualify you must have:

- » An income that is at or below 135% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines or participate in certain assistance programs, such as SNAP, Medi-Cal, or Lifeline;
- » Been approved to receive benefits under the free and reducedprice school lunch program or the school breakfast program, including through the USDA Community Eligibility Provision in the 2019-2020 or 2020-2021 school year;
- » Received a Federal Pell Grant during the current award year;
- Experienced a substantial loss of income due to job loss or furlough since February 29, 2020 and the household had a total income in 2020 at or below \$99,000 for single filers and \$198,000 for joint filers; or
- » Met the eligibility criteria for a participating provider's existing low-income or COVID-19 program.

The program will end once the program funds are exhausted, or six months after the Department of Health and Human Services declares an end to the pandemic, whichever comes first.
